## PRINCIPLES FOR THE AWARD OF FELLOWSHIPS OF THE UNIVERSITY

- 1. Fellowships of the University should be given to individuals in order to:
  - recognise exceptional or important contributions to the work of the University and/or
  - recognise a long and meritorious service to the University (this applies particularly to non-academic members of staff of the University)
- 2. Any member of Court, Council or Academic Board or of the alumni present at meetings of Convocation at which the request for nominations is tabled, may make a nomination.
- 3. Holders of a Newcastle University Fellowship should not also hold an Honorary Degree from Newcastle University; similarly, holders of Newcastle Honorary Degrees cannot be awarded a University Fellowship from Newcastle University.
- 4. Fellowships should not be awarded to staff who are still in the service of the University.
- 5. Unless there are exceptional circumstances, University Fellowships should not be awarded to retired members of the academic staff, particularly Emeritus Professors.
- 6. Nominations should be made in confidence. A nomination should only be discussed with the individual concerned once it has been approved by Court.
