EDI Lecture:

What does ED&I (equity, diversity and inclusion) mean to planning, landscape and architecture?

Who we are as individuals and organisations impacts how we design, the process and whether we create an inclusive built environment. If we understand the need for equity and inclusion and the part we can play, our future could be a different shape.

Grace will be exploring what ED&I means, within the context of architectural practice and education. She’ll introduce an overview of ED&I, how we can offer a broader, relevant perspective for the design world, alongside inspiration from thought leaders and projects. She will also talk about her recent book, entitled Inclusion Emergency: Diversity in Architecture (co-edited with Hannah Durham, published by RIBA Publishing 2024).

Short biography: Grace Choi B.Arch(Hons), Dip.Arch, M.Arch, RIBA

Grace brings more than 2 decades of practice experience across multiple sectors. She is an experienced chair, judge and charitable board member.

Grace graduated from the Mackintosh School of Architecture being awarded the prestigious RIAS silver medal and portfolio prize for Scotland. She later worked for several renowned UK practices for 10 years, with much of her work being highly acclaimed before leaving traditional practice. Challenged by social, ethical and economical imbalance around her whilst raising a young family, she started the practice Grace Choi Architecture in the North East in 2013. The value led, design oriented practice now focusses on the transformation of local communities and homes.

Alongside practice Grace acts as RIBA NE co-chair, led the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion group and sits on the RIBA editorial panel. She has been influential in her efforts to demystify issues of Inclusion to the architectural community, by founding the J.E.D.I. talks. She is a regular visiting reviewer at UK schools of architecture, a speaker, teacher, mentor and writer.
