




About Newcastle














Things to do in Newcastle

- Theatre Royal and independent theatres: Northern Stage and Alphabetti








Outdoor spaces

- Metro Centre: second largest shopping center in UK: train from Central Station and busses from city center






Public Transport

- One of the main methods of travelling around Newcastle is the Tyne and Wear Metro.
- The metro map is divided into zones A, B and C. Zone A covers the city centre, with Haymarket Station opposite our main campus.
- Zones B and C are further away, including locations such as the coast, Newcastle Airport and Sunderland

Public Transport

- The other main way to travel around Newcastle is by taking a bus.
- The three main bus operators are Stagecoach, Go North East and Arriva - each service has its own tickets, you won't be able to use the same tickets between providers.
- Travelling by bus is a great way to explore other areas of the North East that the metro doesn't reach.
- When using the bus, you can pay by cash, card, or through using a Pop Pay As You Go card.
- All busses in Newcastle have 'age 21 and under tickets', making single journeys £1 and day tickets £3.

Chinatown




Chinatown is located along Stowell Street and is one of only five official Chinatowns in England.
